PURSuing JUSTICE IN 2010

On Friday, December 1, as part of a march led by the Southern Human Rights Organizers' Conference in support of domestic workers' rights, Scott Douglas spoke at Central Station about Birmingham's civil rights history, the role domestic workers played in the movement, and the inadequate, underfunded service domestic workers and other transit users deal with today.



On Tax Day - April 15th, 2010 - GBM staff, board members and partners again gathered at the downtown Post Office to call attention to the need for a universal living wage here in the United States. Too many of our neighbors work at jobs paying only minimum wage, but are unable to keep their families fed, clothed and housed. No longer can we say that having a job allows one to survive. Until local wages match the cost of living in our area, many workers and their families will not survive.

EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE DONATIONS OF GOODS

Below is a report of the assistance GBM provided during 2010 to real people, real families, real neighbors who struggle daily to stay safe, sheltered, clothed and fed. GBM's assistance is all based on the generosity of donors like you, so thanks to all of you who made a difference in the lives of each and every one of those represented in the figures below. Note that even though we served over 3,000 families, we had to turn away many more due to lack of sufficient funds. Note, too, that GBM does not try to spread the funds around to increase the number of people we serve. Instead we try to serve as fully as possible those whom we do serve. A \$50 check to pay a \$300 utility bill will not keep the power on and may cause greater stress and risk to the family later.

SPECIAL STORIES

Every year GBM is blessed by volunteers and donors who help us do the work we are committed to - the work of serving people, pursuing justice and building community. Each year a few special individuals and groups do something that speaks of the power of being partners in that work. In 2010 we had a group of four youth from the Forest Park neighborhood of Birmingham raise \$500 for school uniforms - money which helped us provide uniforms to several students whose families could not otherwise afford the required clothing. We also had a high school student from Ohio who came to Birmingham to visit friends during the summer and wanted to do something to help others. He willingly came to GBM to help stock shelves in our food pantry and help sort clothing in our closet. We also had a college student from California decide to spend her required volunteer internship with GBM.

Each of these youth blessed GBM and the people we serve with their time and energy. A hearty thanks to them and to all who volunteered in 2010.

OTHER NEWS NOTES

As is always the case, there is more news from GBM than a newsletter can handle. We thus encourage all our readers who have access to the internet to go online and read more. One of the resources posted on the Faith In Community page is an electronic list of all the books, films and recordings in our ever-expanding resource library. The library grew to 596 items in 2010, a 30% increase that included 109 new books and 21 new CDs and DVDs. We also saw a 77% increase in the library usage in 2010 with 78 items checked out during the year. Come by and check out our books, magazines, DVDs, CDs, and organizing kits. FRESH FOOD



Last year the GBM Garden was organized and maintained by the growing number of women and children involved in GBM's Women As Strength Program (WASP). GBM has also been able to provide nutritious food to families who come to our door on Fridays because of a growing relationship with Grow Alabama. Since starting the collaboration, GBM has been able to distribute fresh vegetables most Fridays. Produce donated by Grow Alabama has included turnips, carrots, lettuce, cabbage, tomatoes, summer squash, zucchini, green beans, corn, potatoes, okra, onions, potatoes, sweet potatoes, collard greens, turnip greens, mustard greens, and assorted other items. SAFE SCHOOLS VIGIL



More than 150 people gathered in Vulcan Park on October 10 for a candlelight vigil in memory of students who committed suicide because of anti-gay bullying. The event was sponsored by Equality Alabama, the Stonewall Democrats, and the Alabama Safe Schools coalition, of which GBM is a member. The Safe Schools Coalition provides educational tools to help school officials identify and stop bullying, and it advocates for inclusion of sexual orientation in every school system's anti-bullying policy. The Birmingham city school system is the only one in the metro area that currently includes sexual orientation. GBM was well represented at the event, as were many of our supporting faith communities.

CONFERENCE IN CHICAGO

GBM staffers Mary Jones, Callie Greer and Kathy McMullen attended the 2010 Facing Race conference in Chicago. They had the opportunity to participate in workshops and hear speakers including Melissa Harris Perry and Van Jones address the economy and green jobs, reproductive justice, LGBT equality, the 2010 elections, disparities in health care reform, the DREAM Act and immigration reform, educational equity, welfare, criminal justice, and the myth of "post-racial America".



VOLUNTEERS IN 2010

Almost 3,000 hours of volunteer time were clocked by over 150 volunteers who came to GBM throughout 2010. People volunteered between 1 ½ hours to over 700 hours. DEMOGRAPHICS

To the right is a current list of the Board of Directors comprised of representatives from 20 faith communities and the larger community of Birmingham who support all aspects of our work Serving People, Pursuing Justice and Building Community.

Since the publishing of our annual report for 2009, GBM has added the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (Southeastern Synod) to our sponsoring faiths. We have also added 3 new members and said farewell to 13. Of those who rotated off our board, 5 were added to our list of Emeriti/ae members.

Currently we have 56 members, 27 (48%) of whom are African-American, 1 (2%) Arab-American, and the remaining 28 (50%) Caucasian. 34 (61%) are female and 22 (39%) male. Other minority classifications are 4 (7%) LGBT and 9 (16%) non-Christian.
